

## Pupil Premium 2016/2017

The Pupil Premium provides funding for pupils:

- who have been in receipt of free school meals (FSM) at any point in the past 6 years (£1320 per child);
- who have been continuously looked after for the past six months (£1900 per child);
- for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces (£300 per child).

Ofsted inspections report on how schools' use of the funding affects the attainment of their disadvantaged pupils.

They also hold schools to account through performance tables, which include data on:

- the attainment of the pupils who attract the funding;
- the progress made by these pupils;
- the gap in attainment between disadvantaged pupils and their peers.

St. James' is committed to providing effective resources and ensuring support is in place for our disadvantaged pupils to improve their academic outcomes.
