Autumn Term

Comprehension:

- Use a thesaurus to acquire new meaning for words (synonyms)
- Compile a list of guestions to ask about the text in order to improve understanding
- Show understanding of what they read by predicting what might happen from details stated or implied
- Draw inferences and infer characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions, and justifying these with evidence from the text
- Identify and comment on the structure and organization of texts including grammatical and presentational features at text level
- Infer or interpret information, events or ideas from the text
- Discuss the conventions of recounts and compare to narrative
- Discuss words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination
- Identify main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph and summarise these
- Summarise the key events within a chapter
- Identify literary devices which engage the reader

Composition and Transcription:

- Write a narrative with a clear structure, setting, characters and plot
- Include descriptions of events and characters in a variety of styles and can sometimes use humour
- Ensure that descriptions have just enough detail to help the reader gain a better understanding about the way the story is unfolding
- Organise paragraphs around a theme
- Make links between paragraphs
- Discuss writing similar to that which they are planning to write in order to understand and learn from its structure, vocabulary and grammar
- Proof read and make improvements to punctuation and spelling
- Assess the effectiveness of the author's word choices
- Include words that have not been used before when describing events, characters and feelings
- Make improvements to vocabulary utilising a thesaurus
- Assess the effectiveness of my own writing

Grammar and Punctuation:

- Use the present perfect form of verbs in contrast to the past tense
- Use inverted commas to punctuate more complex dialogue
- Investigate different ways of opening sentences
- Identify main and subordinate clauses in complex sentences
- Use a range of conjunctions to express time, place and cause

- Apply commas to separate clauses
- Use determiners correctly (a or an)
- Include prepositions to add sufficient detail to writing
- Identify root words
- Add prefixes to form new words

Spring Term

- Discuss the effect specific words and phrases have on the reader
- Provide an explanation of a poem to show understanding
- Identify how language, structure and presentation of a text contributes to meaning
- Retrieve and record information from the text
- Make plausible predictions based on your knowledge of the text
- Ask questions to improve their understanding of a text
- Summarise the main details from more than one paragraph in a few sentences, using vocabulary from the text

Composition and Transcription:

- Include a range of sentences with more than one clause by using a range of conjunctions
- Make improvements to punctuation
- Discuss and record ideas before writing a poem
- Include headings and subheadings
- Assess the effectiveness of their own and other's writing and suggest improvements
- Vary sentences, adding phrases to make the meaning more precise
- Make improvements to vocabulary by utilising a thesaurus
- Identify main ideas from more than one paragraph and summarise these

Grammar and Punctuation:

- Organise writing into at least 3 paragraphs
- Use a range of subordinating conjunctions
- Indefinite articles
- Use paragraphs, headings and subheadings to group related material
- Use powerful verbs to show character or add impact
- Extend a noun phrase by adding a prepositional phrase
- Use apostrophes for possession or omission
- Use similes and alliteration
- Use inverted commas to punctuate direct speech
- Plan and draft a piece of writing

Summer Term

Comprehension:

- Use specific vocabulary and ideas expressed in the text to support own views
- Begin to make reference to the text and support answers
- Make inferences about a character's thoughts, feelings and motives from their actions
- Justify responses by using evidence in the text
- Discuss the effect specific language has on the reader
- Use dictionaries to check the meaning of words

Composition and Transcription:

- · Draft and re-read to check that meaning is clear
- Make improvements to vocabulary by utilising a thesaurus
